Reflections on Faith and Life for Lent 1, February 21, 2021

"God is good!" "All the time." "All the time," "God is good!" This is a call-and-response used in the Via de Cristo (lay-led spiritual renewal movement) and in many congregations. It's a good reminder of our God's faithfulness! So is Romans 8:28, "All things work together for good with those who love God and are called according to his purpose." That doesn't mean God will prevent "bad" things from happening, but that he'll incorporate all things, good and bad and otherwise, into his plan for good for each of us who love and follow him.

We at St. John are *living* proof of that. Three weeks running with no heat: providing a new thermostat after week 1; providing another new thermostat after week 2; and filling our empty fuel tank after week 3. I received from a college roommate (a long time ago in a galaxy far, far away) the Doxology (song of praise) as sung by Minnesotans. It's particularly apt right now as temperatures both high and low have been in the single digits—except when the low temps were something like -24.

Praise God from whom all blizzards flow!
Praise him at thirty-five below!
Praise him in snowdrifts ten feet deep!
Parise him though winter makes us weep!
