Greeting In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Introduction to Readings for November 22, 2020, Christ the King Sunday

The universal rule of God, expressed in Christ the Shepherd-King, is a dominant theme in all the readings this week. The two Old Testament texts reveal the nurturing, protecting role of the Shepherd-King, whose people we are. Psalm 95 praises "the Lord, the great God, the great King above all gods" for being the Lord of "the flock under his care." Ezekiel 34 shows the political nature of the shepherd's guiding and defending role by condemning the succession of shepherd-kings who have neglected and exploited the flock.

Both of the New Testament passages celebrate the victory of Christ. In Matthew 25 the enthroned Son of Man separates the flock. The risen Christ in Ephesians 1 is seated by God "far above all rule and authority and power and dominion." Christ guarantees that God's kingdom has come, is coming, and will come in its fullness.

<u>Call to Worship, Psalm 95:1-7a</u> Sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done marvelous things; his right hand and his holy arm have worked salvation for him. For the Lord is the great God, the great King above all gods. In his hands are the depths of the earth, and the mountain peaks belong to him. The sea is his, for he made it, and his hands formed the dry land. Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker; for he is our God and we are the people of his pasture, the flock under his care.

Confession and Forgiveness P: Let us confess our sin in the presence of God:

C: Holy One, we confess that we are not awake to your presence, not faithful in using your gifts. We forget the least of our siblings and do not see your image in one another. We are infected by sin that divides your beloved community. Open our hearts to your coming, open our eyes to see you in our neighbor, open our hands to serve your creation. Amen.

P: God of all goodness, generations have turned to you, gathered around your table, and shared your abundant blessings. Number us among them so that, as we accept the wonder of your gifts of abundance, we may give thanks for your rich bounty and care for all that you have made, through Jesus Christ, our Sovereign and Servant. **Amen.** (from *Sundays & Seasons*, 2019 Augsburg Fortress)

<u>Prayer of the Day</u> O God of power and might, your Son shows us the way of service, and in him we inherit the riches of your grace. Give us the wisdom to know what is right and the strength to serve the world you have made, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

A reading from Ezekiel, the 34th chapter (34:11-16, 20-24) This is what the Sovereign Lord says: I myself will search for my sheep and look after them. As a shepherd looks after his scattered flock when he is with them, so will I look after my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places where they were scattered on a day of clouds and darkness. I will bring them out from the nations and gather them from the countries, and I will bring them into their own land. I will pasture them on the mountains of Israel, in the ravines and in all the settlements in the land. I will tend them in a good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel will be their grazing land. There they will lie down in good grazing land, and there they will feed in a rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will tend my sheep and have them lie down, declares the Sovereign Lord. I will search for the lost and bring back the strays. I will bind up the injured and strengthen the weak, but the sleek and the strong I will destroy. I will shepherd the flock with justice. This is what the Sovereign Lord says to the shepherds of Israel who care only for themselves: See, I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you shove with flank and shoulder, butting all the weak sheep with your horns until you have driven them away, I will save my flock, and they will no longer be plundered. I will judge between one sheep and another. I will place over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he will tend them; he will tend them and be their shepherd. I the Lord will be their God, and my servant David will be prince among them. I the Lord have spoken.

Word of God, word of life.

A reading from Ephesians, the 1st chapter 1:15-23) Paul writes to the church at Ephesus:

Ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all his people, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better.

I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened so that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that can be invoked, not only in the present age, but also in the one to come. And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

Word of God, word of life.
